








































Vulnerable

Gallery's Note

The exhibition "Vulnerable" is another great adventure undertaken by our Gallery ship. The ship captain was a great artist from New York and our curator, Yukako. She named the target "Vulnerable" and steered the way between timelessness and contemporary. Our crew gathered from 16 countries around the world to present you with their best works. Yukako plotted the route to show us how we can evolve from our vulnerability. It starts from the dark, black and white tones, from anonymous masks, from tiredness and fear, from solitude, and confusion. But nothing can stay forever. The worst expectations may not come true. Scary becomes familiar. Confusion clears. The colors stream into our lives until, suddenly, your spirit is free.

The way Yukako arranged the works is amazing. Each line has its own tune and all together adds up into one continuous story. We hope this story as well as our trip has a happy end.



Christiaan Diedericks: Exhausted Earth III (host)



My work depicts a person in a pin-striped suit (symbolizing big corporations) sitting on a winged-back chair in a barren landscape directly "facing" the viewer. The skull represents the possible demise of our planet — we may have already reached tipping point. In this instance, the skull does not represent Memento Mori (remember that you must die, but rather Memento Vivere (remember that you must live). However, the seated figure is depicted without a head and a single flowering plant is growing from his neck symbolizing hope and a personal belief that it is not too late if the human species is willing to change its ways. A flutter of butterflies surrounds the subject and is employed as a symbol for critical transformation or rather, changing our ways, in order to prevent the total destruction of our planet. The remains of a massive oil tanker are strategically placed on the horizon, a grim reminder of especially oil spills and the negative impact of the persistent use of fossil fuels globally.



In a society that values strength, vulnerability is seen as a weakness. Why give someone else so much power over you? Why lay yourself bare, knowing that you give them all the tools to hurt you, but naively trusting that they won't. Because vulnerability is also our greatest strength: it allows us to create bonds.

It can be tenuous, what keeps us together. And often, it feels like it could all collapse in an instant. I hope that my sculpture conveys this strength in fragility. How can those two thin jagged souls hold onto each other like that? How can they stand so precariously? Because they secretly found a balance in each other. They keep each other from collapsing. In those difficult times, when we are not just kept apart figuratively but also literally, I hope that it can remind us that the first step to find a reprieve from this suffocating feeling of isolation is to embrace the very vulnerability that we are desperately trying to hide.
