






























1st Juried Photo Exhibition

Black and white photography helps us construct unexpected links connecting an image, imagination, memory, and experience. Images in a gray palette leave a lengthier and stronger impression than colored pictures. A character from Kurosawa's film looks at a grey tomato crushed on the ground while viewers imagine a blood spot. The black and white perspective makes the world sharper, cutting out things that we do not need for a focused moment of experience, making a specific place and time more important than other places and times. The purpose of art is to connect the worlds that, at a first glance, are far from each other. 'Black-and-White Voices' are the keywords for this competition.







In the news right now is the invasion of the Ukraine by the Soviet Union. I can't help but be reminded of the Soviet supported Serbian aggression toward Bosnia in the 1990's. During the four year siege of Sarajevo, hundreds of mortars were fired daily on the city targeting civilian assemblies.

The craters left from the damage are now filled with red resin and act as constant reminders of the horror and tragedy of war. They are called Sarajevo roses.





Curator's Award Note

I could not forget this photo from the moment I saw it. To me, this image resonates with the basic idea of the Roland Barthes Camera Lucida book. Barthes' book develops the theory of artistic photography and presents it in two dimensions. One is studium, indicating social and cultural symbolic meanings of an image, and the other is punctum, denoting personally touching details that do not have symbolic meaning but allow the observer to connect to the photography. Anna's falling flakes freeze time and we no longer understand whether the snow



is falling or ascending to the sky. This classic metaphor engages and touches me deeply, connecting between studium and punctum.
