



Born into a multi-generational family of artists, Evgenia Klimenko resides in Odessa, which marks a source of inspiration for all her work.

She is a hunter on many levels, whether seeking the proper texture of a surface for her emerging pastels or catching a whimsical "cinematic" glimpse of street life.

Wherever she travels for her subjects, whether it's just walking the streets of her picturesque city or traveling through an European or American landscape, she creates her personal artistic impression of the place through a condensed "memento mori".

Driven by her desire to immediately reflect on a captured moment, Evgenia uses both traditional and novel skills. Behind her studio's curtain she prefers to experiment, such as by implementing different media (oils, acrylics, pastels, ink, mixed) on various surfaces (canvas, wood, or paper of different texture and her own design). Sometimes a set of works would organically form a coherent series, with its internal scenario.

Curator's Note

Dear Artists,

I am glad to announce that selection round of our Second online exhibition "While Nobody's Watching" is now over. It was a pleasure for me to be a curator of this event. It is truly incredible that the idea of a united art movement from the gallery "People And Paintings" has gotten such great participation and positive resonance.

It was extremely hard to choose one artwork over another. Countless amount of truly amazing artworks, so diverse in style, direction, and materials used! I went through each of the posted artworks within a few days, I looked every single work for several times, paying attention to content, creativity, relation to the theme, performance, and affiliation to one or another culture and traditions!

The point of this exhibition for me wasn't to choose who is a better artist. It was completely opposite. I did my best to show how different and diverse the methods of expression of a single topic could get. This project was another proof, that the language of art is universal, it unites us and has no boundaries.

As a curator of the project, I will use an opportunity to mention those artists who I personally find very talented and amazing, but who wasn't selected for the main exhibition. The reasons could be very trivial: no exhibition name on the post or the idea of the artwork doesn't match with the theme, and for those little cause I couldn't use it in the further steps of the exhibition. However, these works grabbed my attention and I liked them a lot! I'm sure many of these works deserved to be seen and will be included in the future exhibitions.

While Nobody's Watching

"While Nobody's Watching". Aftermath

Dear Artists, Collectors, and Fans,

Time flies and the final day of the exhibition "While Nobody's Watching" has come. We received a total of 654 applications from at least 31 countries!!! Our curator, Evgenia Klimenko, did a tremendous job going through each application and selecting a few for the exhibition. She fought hard with our gallery to increase the number of works admitted to the exhibition. We lost that battle and instead of 20, accepted 28 artworks. In any case, this was a very unusual and challenging exhibition for us. We had to change the rules on the fly several times.

Our goal is to provide a way for great artists around the globe to showcase their works. For many, during this difficult time, this is the only opportunity to advertise. From that perspective, we believe that our goal was achieved. Also, we decided to make all applications free amid the quarantine. Each applicant received publicity as soon as they applied for this competition on our Facebook group "People & Paintings Open". (Interestingly, we were contacted by several collectors who were interested in buying some of the artworks that applied to but were not selected for the exhibition.)

On the next stage, the works selected for the exhibition were posted on our site (Main page and the Exhibition page) for two weeks and the exhibition had officially begun. At the same time, the works were posted on all media we curate including our Facebook page "People & Paintings Gallery", Instagram, Pinterest, Tweeter, and Reddit. Each work received a lot of combined attention. In addition, to promote art, we established an award which at the beginning was called "Exhibition Grand Prix". The monetary award was set at \$100.

This competition started on the exhibition's page on our site. The rule was simple – the artwork with the most "Loves" gets the prize. However, we quickly discovered that "Loves" can be cast without registration on our site and anyone who uses incognito mode on their browser would be able to vote many times in a row. This was the second (but not the last) time we had to change the rules. We decided to move the competition to the Facebook album, considering Facebook's protection system as a trustworthy alternative. Nevertheless, a few people complained that the disproportionate increase of "Likes" of a particular artwork could be a part of inappropriate behavior. Very unfortunately, two artists, as a sign of protest, decided to withdraw from this exhibition leaving the number of the exhibited artworks at 26.

We did react to and investigate the situation as best we could, but we found no evidence of wrongdoing. However, our Gallery always strives to make things right, so we changed the rules (Surprise!) one more time for this exhibition. Hopefully, this will make things right.



So, in the last two days, we had to make a hard decision – how to calculate the "true Likes" and rule out the "Likes" which may look suspicious.

We couldn't use the "Loves" from the website because it was already compromised and we couldn't use the "Likes" from the Facebook Album, because it looked suspicious for some people. We also ruled out the "Likes" from Reddit, Pinterest, and Tweeter as either not considerable or extremely hard to find. Then, we had 3 remaining places where each artwork was posted during this Exhibition: 1) "People & Paintings Open" Facebook group, where all applications were made, 2) the main "People & Paintings Gallery" Facebook page and 3) People & Paintings Gallery page on Instagram. All pages are absolutely transparent and available to everyone for confirmation. There was no reason for any of the contestants to raise "Likes" there using any inappropriate technics simply because it didn't matter. So, we believe those "Likes" can be considered "true Likes" by any means. The Popular Vote Award is going to Thyerri Farias Messagi for his work "Nina".

In conclusion, we want to say that we were very excited to see so many great artists on our pages. So many truly talented people were not selected for this exhibition for one simple reason – each exhibition has its limitations. Even though our brilliant curator, Evgenia Klimenko, managed to "squeeze" 8 additional artworks into our virtual walls, many masterpieces were left behind. We hope to see you all at our next exhibition.
